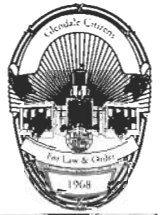

## RSVPs

No, we're not asking for a response to an event. These letters refer to members of the Retired, Senior, Volunteer, Patrol program. This group of individuals is made up of citizens 55 years and older who have the time and a desire to take an active role within a vital area of the Glendale Police Department.

After background checks, the RSVPs are assigned various functions designed to assist the police department. These functions may include, vacation house checks, business checks, parking enforcement, traffic control, graffiti abatement or checking on the elderly. The Patrol Unit is important because it helps free sworn officers to perform their assigned duties.

In 2005-06 this group decided to do something during and after working hours to raise money for the newly formed GPD Canine Unit. Its members collected bottles, cans, all recyclables, checked out trash cans, sites used for lunch time or snacks, dumpsters and were just plain observant as they went about their usual routines. After a year's collecting they turned in enough recyclables to total \$1,000.

They may be 55 plus but don't get in their way when they're collecting for the benefit of our Canine Unit. They tell a string of stories about their escapades which will get you laughing and applauding their efforts. This past summer the RSVPs presented a check for \$1,000 to the Glendale Citizens for Law & Order Canine Account. The members were recognized for their efforts by GCLO and the Canine Handlers.

## Opium Bust

This past July a routine traffic stop for failure to use a turn signal turned into Glendale's largest single opium seizure in the city's 100-year history.

After searching and finding a small amount of opium in the suspect's pocket, Glendale Police Officer Maribel Sumner and K-9 Yudy searched the suspect's van and found a box filled with 12 pounds of opium.

GPD Public Information Officer John Balian said this seizure, Glendale's largest, had a street value at about \$480,000 — close to half a million dollars.

The 12 pounds seized represents a day's dose of opium for about 1,500 users.

Our GPD Canines and their Handlers have returned more in benefits to the community than can be counted in dollars spent.

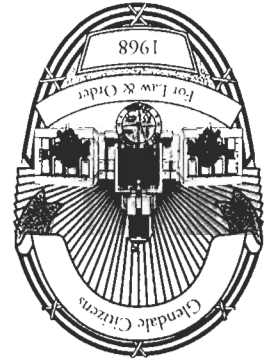

## Assisting the Police Department in Time of Trauma

Dr. Debra Beckel, GPD Psychologist, has been working on a particular project for over a year. The project, now complete and ready for duty, consists of seven Chaplains who are on call, plus the Department's Chaplain, Bob Wong.

When traumatic situations occur in the city, these Chaplains will come to the aid of families, friends and officers. Each brings his unique abilities to cope with tragedy. They have all had background checks and have agreed to make themselves available whenever necessary. The Chaplains are volunteers who attend monthly meetings at the Department and make themselves known to the officers to create more comfortable relationships. They also go on ride-alongs to get a feel for the types of situations officers encounter daily.

Dr. Beckel envisioned these men and women offering to help not only the immediate families, but also to the officers who can then go about their jobs knowing the affected parties are being taken care of by specialists in the field.
